### ***Minutes of February 17, 2021***

Mr. Bechen called the February 17, 2021, Dubuque County Board of Health Special Meeting to order at 6:20 p.m.

#### **1. Roll Call**

#### **2. Public Comments**

Wayne Kenniker – Without transparency and without people listening, things do not go well. When people are working so hard on something, they may not realize it is going down the wrong path. Wayne sees some of that happening here. The mask mandate is like swimming across a river with a boulder in your arms. He believes it is time to drop the boulder and focus more on the vaccination efforts. There are several indicators telling us the vaccination program is not going well. It is a fact that this is because vaccines are coming in slowly, but in other counties, health departments had to give vaccine back because a solid plan was not in place. This could happen to Dubuque County. The program is so disjointed that people can't get a straight answer about what to do or where to go to get a vaccine.

Nichole Weber – Last week listening to Wayne Kenniker, Nichole believes he has made more sense than anyone else. Nichole would like to donate her 3 minutes to Wayne.

Mike Johnson – Would like to donate his 3 minutes to Wayne Kenniker.

Wayne Kenniker – The mask mandate has become more of a burden and distraction from people focusing on vaccinations. Extending the mask mandate will not change people's behavior, and there is no enforcement of the mandate in the county now. Dubuque County could be faced with a higher number of vaccines coming and if the plan is not in place, vaccines could be rescinded. Greater Dubuque Development is now involved, and it is putting another link in the chain of communication. Secondly, phase 1B tier 1

includes those 65+. Many of them probably don't have an employer and/or cannot use the internet to get information. Technology is another battle in this situation. There are many gaps in the plan and communication. For example, where are those without healthcare providers on the list? Wayne references an email he sent that explains how it would work best to get people signed up for the vaccine.

### **3. Approval of Agenda**

Diane Pape-Freiburger made the motion to approve the Agenda for February 17, 2021. Hendrik Schultz seconded the motion. 7 Aye, motion carried.

### **4. Approval of Minutes**

Diane Pape-Freiburger made the motion to approve the Minutes from January 20, 2021; January 29, 2021; and February 3, 2021. Hendrik Schultz seconded the motion. 7 Aye, motion carried.

### **5. COVID-19 Update**

Samantha Kloft shares her screen to display a COVID-19 update slideshow. Patrice Lambert goes through the PowerPoint. Patrice shares that active COVID-19 cases are down significantly compared to 2 weeks ago. She also shares that there have been 5,686 Moderna doses and 13,393 Pfizer doses administered in Dubuque County, equaling a total of 19,079 doses. 8,841 individuals have initiated their first vaccination and 10,234 individuals have completed vaccination (received first and second dose). 44.81% of vaccines administered in Dubuque County have been given to those age 60+.

Patrice then discusses the COVID-19 vaccination plan and sources where the vaccine is coming from (i.e. Walgreens, Hy-Vee, local public health). She also more specifically Dubuque County vaccination progress in phase 1B tier 1 and plans to address phase 1B tier 2 with essential businesses and those with disabilities. The Dubuque Area Chamber and Greater Dubuque Development have been assisting with collecting information on essential businesses in the county. Patrice does break down the vaccine allocations for the week of February 22, 2021, with a total of 2,340 doses. This increase is due to allocations now being based on 6 doses per vial rather than 5.

Additional updates include the start of a COVID-19 vaccination hotline and an explanation of the "burn rate" used by the State to calculate vaccination progress. Patrice also mentions the POD vaccination clinic at the mall. So far it has run successfully and remains by appointment only. She also updates the BOH on POD expenses. These costs will be covered by grant funds.

Diane Pape-Freiburger mentions that in the Governor's conference that day, it was mentioned that total positive cases will be reported differently in the future. Patrice adds

that if a person was tested 10 times for COVID-19, they were counted as 1 test. Now, you will be counted 10 separate times. This will increase testing numbers. No additional information on this has been sent by IDPH as of yet.

Hendrik Schultz comments that the positive testing rate will go down based on this change in data. It is important to inform the public of this.

Diane thanks Patrice and the IMT for the endless hours they have been working.

Supervisor Ann McDonough asks about phase 1B tier 2. She wants to know how information will be gathered on those with disabilities and their care takers, as there is no one place to go for this information. Patrice responds that the IMT has been reaching out to multiple groups to collect this information, including the Northeast Iowa Area Agency on Aging. Ann suggests looking at who participates in Consumer Choice Options and putting out information in media to inform this group of their eligibility.

Diane adds that she has connections with multiple organizations holding databases of those with disabilities. She will connect Samantha and Patrice.

## **6. COVID-19 Funding Requests**

### **a. Action on Alternate Care Site (ACS) Extension**

This site is located at the Mt. Carmel, Marian Hall. There will be no cost to putting this site on hold for March and April but there will be a rental fee if the site must become activated. If activated, the cost of the ACS would be \$4,583 in addition to utilities (~\$1,200 per month). It would serve as an additional site to use if there is another COVID-19 surge and hospitals become overwhelmed.

Tom Berger adds that recently all residents were moved out of Marian Hall, making 20 rooms available with their own bathrooms.

Tom Bechen adds that this seems like a very good safety net for the county.

Diane Paper-Freiburger asks if there will be additional set up fees if activated.

Tom Berger responds that there will probably be some, but those are not known at this time. Patrice adds that there will be BOH meetings to address these costs if they arise. Costs may potentially be covered by grant funds.

Diane Pape-Freiburger made the motion to approve the signage of the ACS lease for 2-month extension and potential activation by Tom Bechen. Katie Jones seconded the motion. 7 Aye, motion carried.

**b. Action on Isolation Facility Contract Extension**

No action required at this time.

Patrice Lambert informs the BOH that the isolation shelter contract does expire at the end of March. The IMT meets with shelter staff on a weekly basis and things are going very well right now. With the potential of COVID-19 surges in the near future, the IMT is looking into extending this contract as well. Site staff are still in discussion about this and there is nothing in writing for the BOH at this time.

This will be tabled for the first BOH meeting in March.

**c. Possible action on Vaccination P.O.D. Expenses**

No action required at this time.

**7. Mask Resolution Public Hearing**

No action to be taken at this time. Mask Resolution Public Hearing to be held on February 24, 2021.

**8. Next Meeting**

The next meeting will be held on February 24, 2021 at 6pm via Zoom. This meeting will include the Mask Resolution Public Hearing.

**9. Public Comment**

Nichole Weber – There is a lot of discussion about spending and Nichole wonders how this funding is being allocated. She would also like to know the location of the isolation shelter. She believes that the County Attorney stated that people can be detained in the shelter against their will if they are suspected of COVID-19. Nichole adds that there is no transparency in the BOH and the meetings. It sounds fiscally irresponsible.

Ann McDonough – Supervisor McDonough was appointed as the BOH liaison for the BOS. She will not vote as a Board member but can assist in communication issues. She hopes to be useful to the BOH moving forward. She also invites Nichole Weber to the weekly BOS meetings and adds that no one has been detained against their will.

Wayne Kenniker – Asks what message can we share as community leaders when people ask, “what can we do to get a vaccine?” he also asks if there is a weekly request sent to the State for vaccinations? Patrice Lambert responds that the State informs counties of the vaccine allocation and size each week. The county does not get to request vaccine.

Mike Johnson – Asks if there is any way to follow up on individuals who have already received the vaccine. Tom Bechen adds that the V-Safe process does follow up daily.

## **10. Adjournment**

Valerie Peckosh made the motion to adjourn at 8:05pm. Diane Pape-Freiburger seconded the motion. 7 Aye, motion carried.

##### **3. Approval of Agenda**

Tom Bechen suggests moving item #8 and #9 to the top of the agenda in respect to all individuals who have joined for the mask mandate resolution public hearing.

Diane Pape-Freiberger made the motion to approve this change and move the mask mandate resolution to the top of the agenda. Hendrik Shultz seconded the motion. 7 Aye, motion carried.

##### **4. Mask Resolution Public Hearing**

Ed Raber and Nathan Gilmore provide brief instruction for all speakers and share their screen to display the list of speakers.

Community members who had registered in advance to speak at the public hearing were recognized at this time. Each speaker was given 3 minutes to share their thoughts on the mask

mandate resolution. See page 6 for a complete list of speakers, as well as written-in comments that were also collected prior to the public hearing.

Tom Bechen thanks all speakers who participated in the mask mandate resolution discussion.

Hendrik Schultz made the motion to take a 10-minute recess. Corey Young seconded the motion. 8 Aye, motion carried.

## **5. Mask Resolution Discussion/Action**

Diane Pape-Freiberger also thanks the public for providing comments on the mask mandate resolution. She also adds that she has personally received many positive comments about continuing the mask mandate in the County.

Hendrik Shultz states that he appreciates all concerns and issues brought to the BOH tonight. From an infectious disease point of view, the pandemic is not over yet. Vaccines are helping to reduce the risk, but a large majority of people who want the vaccine still have not been vaccinated. There is also still no treatment available for COVID-19. This is important for the public and BOS to understand. It is also unknown how the variants will play into this in the future and the impact they will have. Eventually the community will go back to normal, but what will normal look like? Hendrik does not think COVID-19 will go away, and like the flu, we will have a reoccurring baseline of the virus each year. What can change is how many people can get the disease vs. the infection. The 65+ category is somewhat arbitrary as there are many people under that age group that are still at risk. In addition, vaccinating everyone in this current phase will not be enough for immunity. It is reassuring that we have more ventilators to help those with COVID-19, but we need the people to run them. In the future we will have more staff to work in the hospitals as more of them are vaccinated. The mask mandate would be a temporary solution to aiding the current situation.

Katie Jones adds that some people who do recover have long term health effects due to COVID-19 and the more we can protect people before they get COVID-19, the better. She also mentions mental health, which was brought up by many speakers. This is on the BOH radar and Katie suggests adding this to the next meeting's agenda. Many people are concerned for their children, but Katie believes her kids would rather wear a mask and play with their friends than be in a lockdown. Katie agrees with this too when thinking about her own mental health. If wearing masks are going to help us go back to some normalcy sooner, then Katie supports it.

Valerie Peckosh comments that she is very saddened to see this all get political. She shares that the mission of the Dubuque County Board of Health is to "promote and advance healthy behaviors and environments in order to reduce the risk of disease, injury, disability, and premature death. Valarie believes that the mask mandate resolution fits into this definition. She adds that as a dentist, she wears a mask all day every day, it just takes getting used to.

Suzie Stroud adds that the BOH is composed of volunteers who are not political but doing the best with the information they have. Everyone is feeling the impacts of the pandemic including Suzie who has a father in a nursing home and a middle school student at home. She believes masks are working in the community.

Adam also adds a thank you for all written and verbal comments shared. He adds that while he thinks masks are important, he also trusts science and health care professionals. He believes we are headed in the right direction and he would like to continue that way.

Tom Bechen states that the most recent mask mandate resolution states: "The provision of this proclamation shall continue until the Dubuque County Incident Management Team declares that Phase 1B is completed in Dubuque County, or by June 15 2021, whichever occurs sooner."

Diane Pape-Freiberger comments that data on the Iowa COVID-19 dashboard will not provide a specific number for those 65+ who have been vaccinated. To use data we do not have a handle on is a concern. She also adds that hospitalization data shows Dubuque County residents that are hospitalized with COVID-19, not how many COVID-19 patients are in our hospitals. Diane would like to set a date rather than the completion of 1B to determine when to revisit the mask mandate.

Hendrik Shultz responds that he agrees with Diane's comments about hospitalizations. He believes the BOH needs to consider the at-risk population and get as close as possible to vaccinating all of them. He understands that there is not a perfect solution but reaching a majority of 65+ would be a good start. His concern is that population, as they are the ones dying from COVID-19 significantly more than the other age groups. Vaccinating those in 1B will ensure more workers to support others during the pandemic.

Diane asks if June 15 is too soon. Hendrik responds that one measure will not fix all and expresses his support for including both a date and data to determine an end date to the mask mandate resolution or begin loosening restrictions.

Diane is concerned about the potential lack of accurate data. Hendrik believes we can get a pretty good sense of this data with Patrice Lambert and the Incident Management Team's work.

Valarie Peckosh suggests that the mask mandate resolution go until June 15, unless 1B is not completed by then. It is difficult for the BOH to predict where we will be in June with limited information about the number of vaccines coming into the County. Hendrik suggests getting as many people vaccinated as possible before June 15.

Katie Jones believes the public would appreciate the BOH revisiting the resolution at a specific time. Suzie Stroud adds that this would also improve transparency between the BOH and the community.

Tom Bechen adds that 8 weeks ahead of June 15 is mid-April. This would be when the BOH revisits the resolution. Hendrik would like to include a note in the resolution about reassessing the situation 8 weeks before June 15. Katie Jones does point out that the resolution already states that the resolution can be reevaluated or modified at any time.

Diane Pape-Freiberger made the motion to approve the mask mandate resolution as written. Katie Jones seconded the motion. 8 Aye, motion carried.

The mask mandate resolution will now go to the BOS for action on Friday, February 26, 2021 for final approval.

#### **6. Approval of Minutes**

Diane Pape-Freiberger comments that in item #3, Diane and Hendrik both agreed that every life matters whether it was in the 80% or 20%.

Diane Pape-Freiberger made the motion to approve the Minutes from February 11, 2021 as amended. Hendrik Schultz seconded the motion. 8 Aye, motion carried.

#### **7. Board of Health/Board of Supervisors Liaison**

Tom Bechen starts the discussion by explaining that Supervisor Ann McDonough has recently been appointed the BOS liaison to the BOH and he would like to set the rules for engagement. In other counties, there is an agenda item that allows the BOS liaison to bring any issues to the BOH.

Supervisor Ann McDonough responds that it is up to the BOH how to utilize this opportunity. She adds that the aim is to improve communication both ways.

Tom adds that maybe it is best to let this develop overtime rather than set rules or guidelines right now. He also comments that Ann and he may have discussions offline to stay aligned.

#### **8. COVID-19 Update**

Patrice Lambert shares that she appreciated hearing everyone's point of view on the mask mandate. She adds that the IDPH does calculate a burn rate for how many vaccines are administered each week. Last week Dubuque County had well over 100%, because we were working on 5 dose vials. The IDPH is now counting 6 doses a vial. Stacey Killian will collect burn rate information from each provider on a weekly basis to stay on track. She adds that the providers in Dubuque County have been excellent to work with. The IMT received notification this week that Dubuque County will be receiving the same amount of vaccine that they did the previous week, but that this may increase in the near future. The IMT continues to meet weekly with all local providers, including pharmacies working through the federal program. Lastly, Patrice shares that there was an ad in the papers advertising the new County vaccine hotline phone number for those 65+ who do not have a regular health care provider. If a provider has cancellations, names from this list will be provided.

Diane Pape-Freiburger asks if pharmacies report their vaccination numbers to LPH or does the state know that. Patrice responds that we meet with them weekly to get information on their end. Pharmacies are required to report to IRIS after giving the vaccine, like all other providers.

Diane comments that there is a rumor Johnson County has vaccinated cancer patients. She found that this is not true. Patrice replies that the IMT hears rumors such as this often, and it is best to get information from a credible source.

Diane asks how the new COVID-19 hotline is going. Patrice responds that Samantha Kloft has been recording voicemails this week, but the responsibility will shift to the VNA soon. Over the weekend there were about 373 calls into the line. The answering machine does hold 450 calls, but Nathan Gilmore with Dubuque County IT has been able to expand that.

#### **11. Public Comment**

Ann McDonough – Many people have contacted Supervisor McDonough with positive comments about the vaccine clinic at the mall. Also, she is receiving many contacts asking if those 65+ can get an update from their health care providers about where they are in their vaccination list.

Nicole Wolfe-Murphy – Asks what is the projected end date for the end of phase 1B. She also stresses concern about the long-term effects of the COVID-19 vaccine. Lastly, she asks if all ventilators have ever been used in one day, week, or month in Dubuque.

All other comments were on agenda items and will not be recorded at this time.

#### **12. Adjournment**

Diane Pape-Freiburger made the motion to adjourn at 8:40pm. Hendrik Schultz seconded the motion. 8 Aye, motion carried.

The following comments were addressed to the Dubuque County Board of Health by citizens of Dubuque County for their meeting on February 24 2021. The meeting regarded a Mask Mandate Resolution for the County, and included a public hearing.

**1. Chris Boxleiter**

I am writing to put my comments into the record and to be read in at the 2/11/21 Dubuque County hearing.

The arrogance thru which Dubuque County and the City of Dubuque have conducted themselves over past 8-9 months is staggering. They have shut down local businesses, instituted draconian and nonsensical policies that virtually every common sense individual rolls their eyes at. I wonder sometimes if Dubuque government officials have even read the mask mandate proclamation.

Only the policy makers look at themselves and think, "we have done a good job". You have completely ignored any sense of individual liberty and freedom in your decision making to see who can virtue signal the most.

For months I have asked commonsense questions about mask efficacy and the potential downside of the mask mandate of local officials. To date, not one official has given me a substantive answer on these topics. I only receive back platitudes. Their lack of answers were clear though, they have no clear evidence that mask mandates work. As one city official put it..."doing nothing is not an option" when challenged with many questions he didn't have an answer too. When I read this I knew we were in trouble.

If our "leaders" are acting on a whim to say they "did something" without any discussion on the negative side affects, the infringement on personal freedoms, or their ability to recommend certain practices vs impose them....then that is disqualifying in my book. We all know you were just following other counties actions. No independent thought truly went into this decision. You did it because it was the easy thing to do.

I have posited that government officials across the country should leave masking decisions to the individuals and businesses. The government should play absolutely no role in telling a free citizen what they where on their face. I am sickened by the lack of a public response to these measures. While privately many people tell me the mandates are a joke, they gleefully wear them in public to not be shamed. WHEN WILL THIS STOP!

There are voluminous studies that shows masks have provided virtually no benefit and to the contrary have shown a pattern of COVID cases skyrocketing only after mask mandates were imposed (Dubuque being one of them). COVID 19 has ran its course in every corner of our country essentially following the same pattern, regardless of public policy. These mandates have been instituted to provide a false sense of protection.

Furthermore, in March of 2020 the CDC's blanket policy on masks being effective against spread of COVID or other like viral diseases was to recommend against mask wearing! Now we have bureaucrats seriously telling us to wear two masks at the same time. These are not serious people. In light of rolling out a vaccine in our community you are looking to make your policies more restrictive. What is the point of even having a vaccine if you are getting more restrictive as immunity grows each day? Should we expect to wear masks for years? You of course never think this many steps ahead...

If you feel at risk or are an at risk individual wear a mask. Stay home 24/7 if you would like. Get the vaccine, be cautious. But the 99.9% of us who have virtually no risk of COVID 19 should not stand for these draconian measures any longer. This is clearly about power and virtue signaling, typically those in government are the best at it.

## **2. Abby L. Jones**

I read the article in today's Telegraph Herald regarding the proposed county mask mandate extension. First of all, I want to say that I am a strong supporter of the county mask mandate and fully support the extension of it. My concern however with what I read in the article is the logic being used to extend it until Phase 1B is complete or by June 15, whichever comes sooner. My husband (age 45) falls into Phase 1C as an individual aged 18-64 with underlying medical conditions which per the CDC "increase the risk of serious, life threatening complications from COVID-19". He suffers from two conditions that the CDC has deemed fall into this category – Chronic Liver Disease and a Weakened Immune System from using Steroid or Other Medications. His hepatologist at the University of Iowa Hospitals & Clinics has advised him to take extreme precautions including avoiding any interactions with the general public, i.e. going into stores, restaurants, sending our kids back to school, etc. So with that said, I have to disagree with the comment from Dr. Hendrick Schultz that with the completion of Phase 1B "We'll have the highest vulnerable population taken out of the risk zone." I can say for certain that my husband is at a much higher risk of life-threatening complications than the vast majority of those in Phase 1B, with the exception of those aged 65+. For that reason, I would argue that the mask mandate should be extended until those in Phase 1C with underlying medical conditions are vaccinated as well.

I would also like to take this opportunity to plead my case for my husband and others like him to be vaccinated sooner. I have been working tirelessly to get a vaccine for my husband in spite of him falling into Phase 1C for the sake of our children who are suffering greatly by attending school virtually as they've watched their classmates at Resurrection Elementary attend school in-person 5 days a week since the beginning of the school year. My heart breaks every day as I see them missing out on in-person learning, building friendships, participating in the sports they love, and trying to keep them active while we've essentially been locked in our house for almost a year. We would like to register our opinion on the extension of the mask mandate. We are both health care providers and have kept a very close eye on the rise and fall of the COVID cases in Dubuque county. We also have a good understanding of immunology and microbiology. As of now, there are 191 deaths due to COVID in Dubuque county. That number is over the last year and comprises approximately 0.2% of the population of the county. Every death is tragic, as we all recognize. In the last 2 months, the positivity rate has dropped significantly in the county. This could be from the mask mandate, but this is occurring nationwide. Deaths are also decreasing significantly. We have treatments that are fairly successful if used at the first sign of infection. These are known as monoclonal antibodies (bamlanivimab and etesevimab). We also know more about this virus and are much more knowledgeable about how to treat patients than we were in the spring and early summer of 2020, so survival has improved. As we write this, the positivity rate in Dubuque is 6.3% and there are 13 people in the hospital that are COVID positive. It would be interesting to know what the numbers were on this date 2 years ago for influenza. I obviously understand that this is not influenza but the statistics we currently have

would line up with our normal influenza numbers in past years. We were not wearing masks or even considering wearing masks back then.

According to the CDC the mortality rate of COVID is the following for each age group: > 70 years old-95.4%, 50-69 years-99.5%, 20-49 years-99.9%, 0-19 -99.997%. This means that everyone under the age of 50 has a higher survival rate than the common flu.

Vaccinations are going well and a large portion of people over 70 have received theirs in the county. These are the ones at risk. The risk under this age is much less. Those of us who have had COVID should be able to be without masks anyway as we are immune. 12,195 people in the county have tested positive since this began. That is 12.2% of people who are immune to this virus. These are the people who have been tested. There is likely a significant portion who have had the virus and were not tested that are now immune as well. The latest study out of the UK has studied immunity at least up to 8 months and even then, the T cell and B cell population has persisted. This is important because this shows that the body can "remember" the SARS-CoV-2 virus. If it encounters the virus again, the memory B cells can quickly gear up and produce antibodies to fight the re-infection. Those who have recovered from COVID-19 could have immunity against reinfection for months, or perhaps even years, the authors of this study said. Yet even though we suffered through the infection, we still have to wear a mask for no scientific reason. People say we need to "follow the science." This is the science! It seems that people want to pick and choose the science that perpetuates fear.

There is such a depersonalization that has occurred in this county since masks have been required. People don't look each other in the eye at the grocery store or even say hi anymore. We urge you allow us to return to some sense of normalcy. It is time to relax this mandate. We need to see and recognize our neighbors.

#### **9. Daniel Givens**

To the members of the Dubuque County Board of Health-

I would like to write with strong support of continuation of the mask mandate for Dubuque County. I understand the need to have an end date and not continue this indefinitely, and rather

than establish an arbitrary end date, I would support the proposed timing of ending the mandate after phase 1b of vaccination.

As you are aware, COVID19 is a respiratory virus, and masks are extremely effective at reducing transmission. As an Otolaryngologist, I am exposed to coughs and sneezes all day, every day. While wearing a KN95 mask and Face shield during these procedures, I never contracted COVID19 (as evidenced by negative antibody testing prior to my vaccination). Additionally, I performed two airway surgeries on COVID19 positive patients, where blood and respiratory secretions were coughed on my face shield, and these methods were effective protection for me. I also performed a facial reconstructive surgery on two COVID19 patients, each lasting 1.5 hours, with my face less than 18 inches from theirs, and my mask and shield prevented transmission. All of these scenarios were prior to my vaccination.

It is easy to dismiss masks due to public opinion, and lack of published scientific studies, however I hope that the above provides a real-world anecdote of the efficacy of masks.

It was the words you didn't want to hear. It was even worse when they tell you he needed to be put on ventilator. Every day when you talked to the nurse his condition was worse than the day before. Because of Covid I no longer have a husband, the kids no longer have a dad and the grand kids don't have their grandpa. We have an empty chair at our table.

I have had several people ask me what Ron died of and when I say Covid some of their response was he couldn't have died of Covid , there's no such thing. All I could say was that is his cause of death on his death certificate.

I also had Covid but I was one of the lucky ones and survived. I do have side effects from it. I now have shortness of breath and have had to see a Cardiologist for my heart. There can still be much more in the future.

I do not want anyone to have to go through what we did. The number of Covid cases has decreased since we had the mandate to wear masks. So, we know wearing mask does work. Why would you want to stop wearing them now? If not for yourself wear them to protect your family, friends, neighbors etc.

## **INTRODUCTION**

The purpose of this memo is to request Dubuque County Board of Health support of the establishment of a COVID-19 vaccine point of distribution (POD) at the Grand River Center when and if an appropriate amount of vaccine becomes available. This support would include financial support from the Dubuque County Board of Supervisors as described below. If supported by the Board of Health, the recommendation would be forwarded to the Supervisors for final approval.

## **BACKGROUND**

As of March 8, 2021, 11,115 Dubuque County residents have been vaccinated against COVID-19. Through the federal Operation Warp Speed, vaccines are now flowing to Dubuque County through four different avenues: to the State of Iowa, who then allocates vaccines to counties for distribution; through the federal retail pharmacy program; to longterm care facilities; and to federally-qualified health centers. At this time, vaccine availability continues to be limited and vaccines are distributed based on priority status identified by the State of Iowa and influenced by the local Incident Management Team. Some providers have located at the vaccine POD at the former Younkers women's clothing store at the Kennedy Mall in order to provide better access to the public, with great success. The Board of Health and Board of Supervisors have funded the costs of the POD.

The Incident Management Team acknowledges little information to predict the amount or timing of vaccine to Dubuque County, but with the White House goals and assumptions that vaccine will be available for all who can receive it by the end of May, we want to be prepared to take advantage of larger vaccine allocations.

## **DISCUSSION**

In anticipation that vaccine availability will continue to increase, the City of Dubuque Fire Department has become an approved vaccine provider. With this increase in availability of staff to provide the vaccine, and to address the expanding vaccination priority groups and needs of the community, the Incident Management Team is requesting your support of the attached contract and the plan below to operate a vaccine POD at the Grand River Center.

*POD Location & Operation:* The proposed POD would take place at the Grand River Center. The location is ideal in its proximity to the downtown and capacity to serve large numbers of individuals. The downtown location has the ability of being able serve public transit-dependent and other traditionally hard to reach populations, when supported by a robust and targeted outreach strategy.

The location offers the option to operate a drive-through clinic, which allows for up to four “lanes” of vaccines at one time. Attached is a preliminary traffic management map for the site. This drive-through clinic would be staffed by City Fire Department and supported by non-Fire City staff for administrative and traffic management needs.

The location offers the option for an indoor walk-in clinic should vaccine and staff capacity be available as well. This clinic could be operated by City Fire Department staff or other qualified providers. Crescent Community Health Center has indicated their clinic could also serve as a walk in point for vaccination, pending allocation of vaccine to them through the Federally Qualified Health Center distribution.

The fire department would provide vaccine delivery based on any allocation from the Dubuque County Public Health Incident Management Team. Fire department paramedics will provide an estimated capacity of approximately 48 vaccines per hour. Depending on supply of vaccine, hours of operation would be planned to dispense all allotted vaccine each week.

The attached contract reserves both the parking garage and associated parking lots and Exhibit Hall A inside the Grand River Center from April 1 to July 31 with the exception of existing reserved dates for Exhibit Hall A. The contract offers the option for either party to extend or cancel the contract with 21 days’ notice. These drive-through and walk-in clinics could be operated with flexible hours depending on vaccine availability and community need.

To ensure staff are able to operate and connect to necessary databases, improvements to the wireless connectivity and access points in the parking garage is proposed. City staff are currently working with CEC to install these improvements prior to the April 1 date.

#### *Budget Impacts*

The Incident Management Team requests Board of Health support for Dubuque County to enter into the attached contract with the Grand River Center and pay for the facility-related expenses of clinic operation.

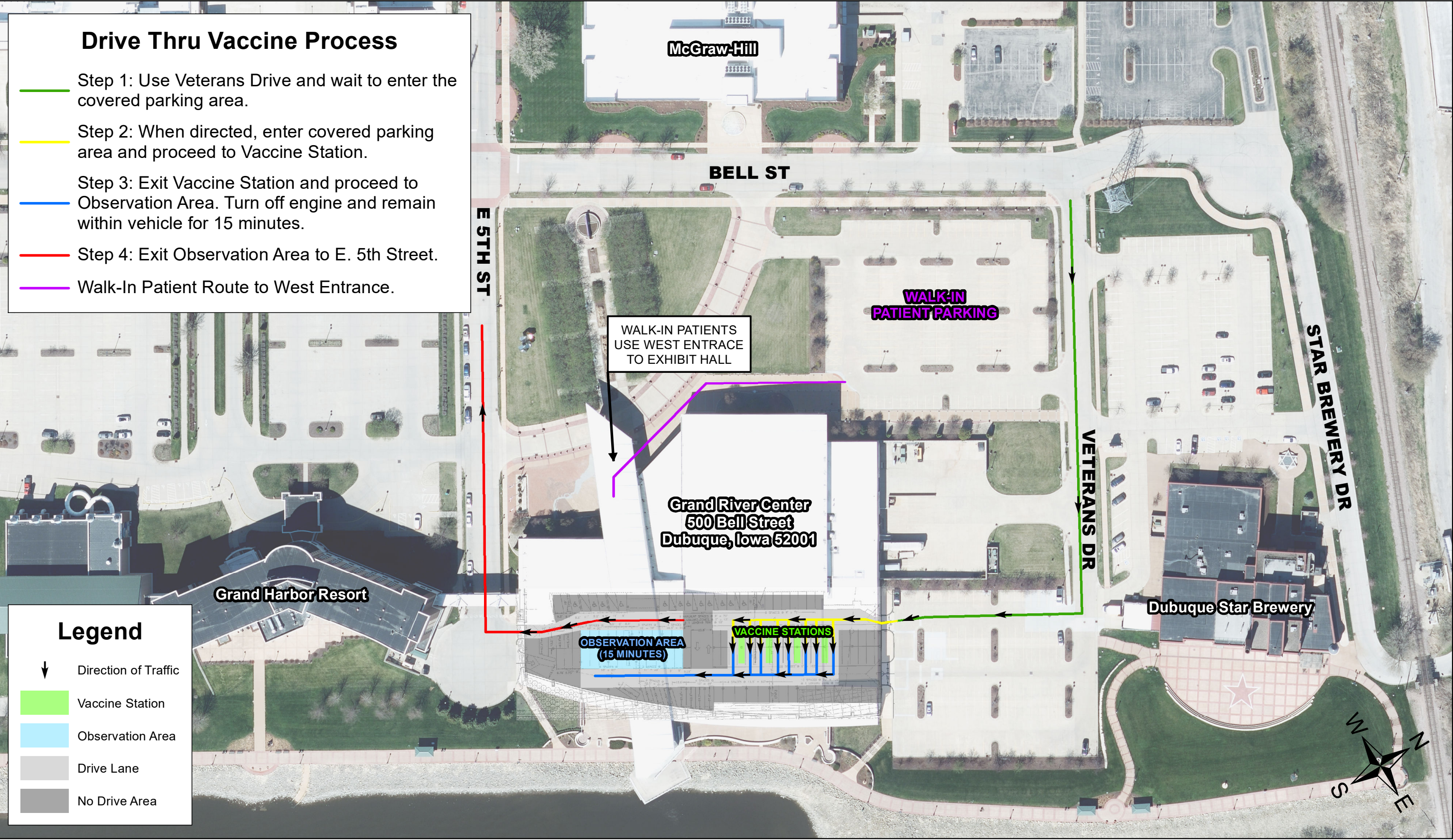

### Drive Thru Vaccine Process

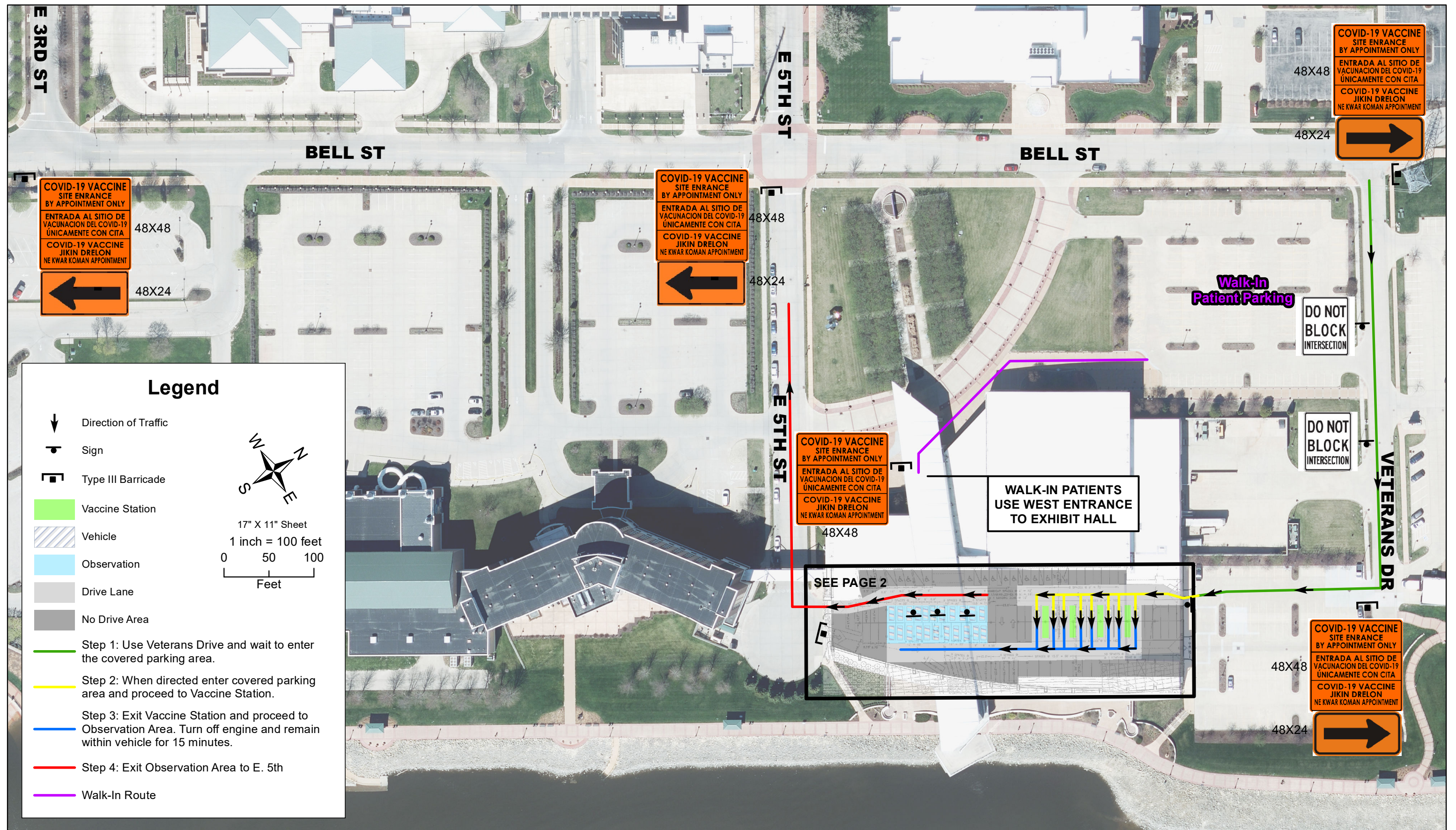
- Step 1: Use Veterans Drive and wait to enter the covered parking area.

- Step 4: Exit Observation Area to E. 5th Street.
- Walk-In Patient Route to West Entrance.

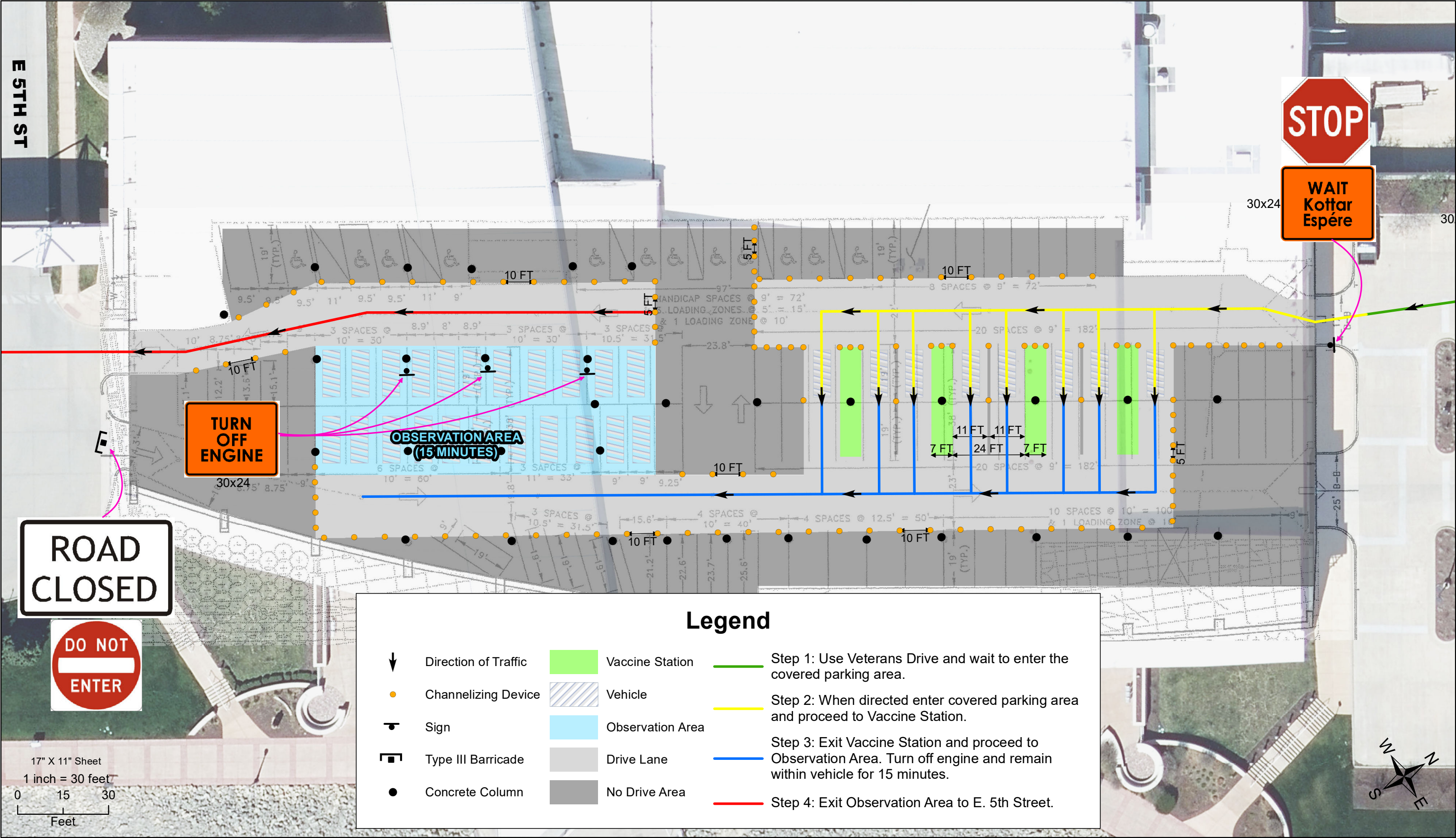

**City of Dubuque** ("Group") and Grand River Center agree as follows:

By signing and returning the enclosed copy of this contract by **March 26, 2021** these arrangements will be agreed to on a definite basis.

Between now and **March 26, 2021**, unless both parties have agreed upon and fully executed this agreement, should another organization request the dates and be in a position to confirm immediately, we will advise you and you will have three (3) business days to confirm on a definite basis.

#### **SCHEDULE OF EVENTS:**

4/05/2021 – 7/31/2021 Exhibit A (or a room equivalent) \$4000/ per month

4/05/2021 – 7/31/2021 Parking Garage and both East and West Parking Lots (\*\*\*Grand River Center will be allowed use of all Parking areas at 4pm on each Saturday during the duration of this agreement \*\*\*) \$2500/ per month

Each area can be extended or canceled with a 21 day notice

#### **BILLING ARRANGEMENTS**

Your Master Account will be due upon receipt of an invoice from the Grand River Center. In the event that any charges remain unpaid after thirty days from the date of the invoice, you agree to pay, in addition to the balance due to the Grand River Center, a late payment charge equal to the lesser of 1-1/2% per month or the highest rate permitted by law on the remaining balance until paid in full. We will request that you review your Master Account with our Accounting Department prior to your departure.

#### **FORCE MAJEURE**

The performance of this Agreement by either party is subject to acts of God, government authority, disaster, strikes, civil disorders, or other emergencies, any of which make it illegal or impossible to provide the facilities and/or service for your meeting. It is provided that this Agreement may be terminated for any one or more of such reasons by written notice from one party to the other without liability.

#### **CLAIMS AND DAMAGES**

The group agrees that it shall look solely to the Grand River Center for all claims and damages arising out of this agreement, and that it shall have no recourse against the City of Dubuque or any of its employees, agents' officers or officials with request to any claims or damages arising under this agreement.

## **INSURANCE**

The Grand River Center and the Group shall obtain and maintain and provide evidence of insurance upon request in amounts sufficient to provide coverage for any liabilities which may reasonably arise out of or result from the respective obligations pursuant to this contract.

## **INDEMNIFICATION**

Each party hereby agrees to indemnify, defend and hold the other harmless from any loss, liability, costs or damages arising from actual or threatened claims or causes of action resulting from the gross negligence or intentional misconduct of such party or its respective officers, directors, employees, agents, contractors, members or participants (as applicable), provided that with respect to officers, directors, employees, and agents, such individuals are acting within the scope of their employment or agency, as applicable.

## **AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT**

Both the Group and the Grand River Center shall be responsible for compliance with the public accommodation requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act as defined by law. The Grand River Center shall provide, to the extent required by the Act, such auxiliary aids and/or services as may be reasonably requested by Group, provided that Group gives reasonable advance written notice to the Grand River Center of such needs. Group shall be responsible for the cost of any auxiliary aids and services (including engagement of and payment to specialized service providers, such as sign language interpreters), other than those types and quantities typically maintained by the Grand River Center.

## **ARBITRATION-DISPUTE RESOLUTION-ATTORNEY'S FEES**

Any controversy, claim or dispute arising out of or relating to this Agreement, shall at the option of the Grand River Center be settled through non-binding mediation or binding arbitration conducted in accordance with the rules of the American Arbitration Association or through an action brought in any court of competent jurisdiction in the State in which the Grand River Center is located for trial and determination by such court sitting without a jury, under the law of such State in either case. In connection with any such litigation, including appellate proceedings, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover reasonable attorneys' fees and costs. In addition, Group shall be responsible for payment of attorneys' fees and interest associated with the Grand River Center's efforts to collect moneys owed under the terms of this Agreement. The parties consent to the exclusive jurisdiction of a court of competent jurisdiction in the State in which the Grand River Center is located and to service of process outside the State in which the Grand River Center is located pursuant to the applicable requirements of such court in any matter so submitted to it and THE PARTIES EACH EXPRESSLY WAIVE THE RIGHT TO A TRIAL BY JURY. Any judgment or award rendered by the arbitration as referenced above may be entered in any court in the State in which the Grand River Center is located having jurisdiction thereof or in any court having jurisdiction over the party against whom judgment is sought to be enforced. Neither party shall under any circumstances be responsible for indirect, consequential or punitive damages.

## **NOTICE**

Any notice required or permitted by the terms of this contract must be in writing. Notice must be sent by certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, or by a recognized overnight courier service with provision for a receipt. Notices shall be deemed effective as of the date shown on the receipt.

## **WAIVER**

If either party agrees to waive its right to enforce any term of this contract, it does not waive its right to enforce any other terms of this contract.

## **SIGNATURE**

This contract, with exhibits attached (if any), constitutes the entire agreement between the parties and may not be amended or changed unless done so in a writing signed by Grand River Center and Group.

The undersigned represent that they are authorized to sign and enter into this contract.

If a fax transmittal is used by either party, then the fax copy shall serve as an original until an actual original is executed and received by both parties.
